Care of Self

Toddler: dress/undress, manage shoes (slip-on/velcro), brush teeth/hair, wash hands/self, blow nose, toileting, <u>carry school</u> <u>belongings</u>

ECC: buttoning, zipping, snapping, tying, working towards independent bathing, <u>carry school belongings</u>

UE/AC: identifying and responding to changing personal hygiene needs

Care of the environment and contribution to family life



PD Tools: <u>Family Meetings</u>, <u>Job</u> <u>chart/wheel/board</u>, <u>Take Time for Training</u>, <u>Routines</u>, <u>Follow Through</u> It is not what you do for your children, but what you have taught them to do themselves that will make them successful human beings.

Toddler

- Restore toys and activities
- Sit at table appropriately
- Make bed
- Clean spills
- Assist with setting table
- Clear table space
- Scrub (dishes, surfaces, toys, etc...)
- Help water plants
- Assist with anything you are doing



ECC

- Restore toys and activities (use 1 at a time)
- Laundry: Help sort, put in washer and transfer, fold simple items, put away
- Sweep, mop, vacuum (manual carpet sweeper), dust
- Setting and clearing table
- Loading/unloading dishwasher
- Prepare simple breakfast and snack
- Assist with cleaning bathrooms
- Gardening, pull weeds, pick up yard debris,
- Water plants
- Help pack lunch
- Have input in meal planning
- Help cook
- Mend buttons, small tears
- Use tools



LE

- Pack own lunch
- Prepare snacks
- Assist with meal planning, prep, cooking
- Help with laundry
- Maintain room (mostly) independently
- Take out trash, recycling
- Volunteer opportunities/service projects
- Opportunities to earn, save, and spend money
- Complete household jobs independently
- Assist with household projects
- Use tools

UE

Independently...

- Wash own dishes and put away
- Gardening and yard maintenance
- Laundry
- Take out trash
- Recycling
- Dishwasher
- Household/neighborhood projects

AC

Independently...

- Wake themselves up
- Prepare their own breakfast
- Pack their own lunch
- Bring everything they need to school and carry own materials inside
- Do own homework and seek help from guides
- Actively participate in household maintenance

Independent Play and Exploration of Interests





Toddler/ECC

"Passive toys make active learners"

- High quality, open-ended toys (rotate to increase interest)
- Art area with accessible materials
- Books...audiobooks...story podcasts
- Games
- Chalk/dry erase board
- PLAY OUTSIDE!
- Observe for their interests...

Elementary

- Exploration/Research of personal interest
 - Interesting reference books, encyclopedias, field guides, etc...
 - □ Supplies to creatively express research
 - Telescope, microscope, binoculars, magnifying glass, bug boxes...
- Games: board, card, puzzles, trivia
- PLAY OUTSIDE!
- Let them be bored!

Adolescent Community

Activities that meet your child's need for **self-expression**, such as:

- Encouraging science experiments
- Opportunities to express opinions
- Baking
- Sewing and crafting supplies
- Outdoor adventure

Other life skills

- Table manners, polite greetings
- Writing letters and thank you cards
- Going to library
- Time management
- Calendar skills
- Conversation with people of all ages
- Earning and managing money

Preparing the Social Environment



Home is their safe space... ...and often where you will see big emotions

(After school restraint collapse)

Model and encourage:

- Self-advocacy
- <u>Self regulation</u>
- Learning and growing from mistakes and challenges

PD Tools: <u>Validate Feelings, Curiosity Questions,</u> <u>Connection before Correction, Encouragement (not praise)</u>, Mirror (point out what you see)

Adolescence: Preparing the Social Ground

"Parenting adolescents can try your patience, and it can certainly challenge your authority. But remember: your goal is not to raise children who become obedient, unthinking adults. Your goal is to raise fully-actualized adults who know how to discern good from bad, who see themselves as useful contributors and who influence the world for the better. "

The Prepared Adult

- Model
- Observe and adapt
- Schedule calm time throughout week

PD Tools: <u>Pay attention</u>, <u>Decide what you will</u> <u>do, Empower your Kids</u>, <u>Letting Go</u>, <u>Avoid</u> <u>Pampering</u>, <u>Don't Back Talk Back</u>, <u>Control</u> <u>Your Behavior</u>, <u>Recovery from Mistakes</u>

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Self-Advocacy

- FIRST ask your child about their work and academic questions
- Encourage them to ask guides for help...Then contact guides if you have additional questions/concerns
- Guides will also contact you with questions/concerns.

Takeaways

- Model what is important to your family
- Prep environment for and encourage independence
- Involve children in purposeful ways
- Listen and be curious: encourage their personal interests and share yours
- Develop relationships with NWMS guides and staff...we are part of your village!
